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Each year, up to 25 sophomores are selected to become Luther Hodges Scholars. Students are selected for their superior scholarship, interest in research, and desire to work with private and public sector professionals to address the timeliest, most pressing issues facing business and society.

Scholars are introduced to the critical role that business and the private sector play in providing solutions to these challenges. They develop competencies in leadership, research, and cross-sector collaboration that are essential for their success as leaders. The program's competency-based curriculum combines classroom learning with field experiences with lawmakers, policymakers, and non-profit professionals who work to make life better for residents in North Carolina and beyond.

Essential to their success, scholars receive individualized coaching and advising, research guidance from Kenan-Flagler faculty, and financial support for professional development opportunities tailored to their career interests. Scholars also have access to many resources of the Kenan Institute, including translational research, access to invitation-only conferences and forums, and connections to the Kenan Institute's affiliated centers.

This event celebrated this incredible program milestone and was attended by current scholars, alumni, Kenan-Flagler faculty and staff, local business and community leaders, and the Hodges family, including Mr. Luther H. Hodges, Jr. himself. We are immeasurably grateful to the Luther Hodges Family for their investment in the program and look forward to seeing their legacy continue through the contributions of our students!

Refinements

This year, we took a more deliberate approach with programming, choosing to refine and update our efforts rather than introduce wholesale new initiatives. Read below for a recap of enhancements enacted to ultimately improve the scholar experience.



Caffeinated Connections

Caffeinated Connections is a new offering that provides scholars with an additional informal engagement opportunity to connect with program staff and with each other over coffee or tea. Scholars are offered a variety of meeting days and times and on- and offcampus location options.

Advising Requirement

Luther Hodges Scholars engage in personalized one-on-one advising sessions with a dedicated advisor to connect them with campus and community resources, secure research opportunities, and develop professional goals aligned with their values and interests. Students meet twice per semester with an additional midsemester check-in. Goal setting is a key component of scholar advising. Prior to a recent change, each semester, each scholar was required to develop three goals, each related to the program's three competences. Now, each scholar develops only one goal that's related to the competency focus of their year in the program. The three competency areas are cross-sector collaboration (sophomore year); research (junior year); and leadership (senior year).

Canvas Update

Canvas is an online platform that serves as the UNCs official Learning Management System. The platform is used primarily by course instructors to manage their courses, communicate and share course materials with students, and collect and provide feedback on student work. Similarly, the Scholars program utilizes a Canvas site to communicate and share program materials with scholars. Recent updates to the Canvas site's appearance and user-friendliness are intended to enhance communication of community resources and opportunities, provide student access to important documents such as Exploratory Fund Request forms, and improve the program's overall communications.

Explorations Initiative

The Luther Hodges Scholars Explorations Initiative provides scholars with an additional curated experiential learning opportunity outside of the academic curriculum. Explorations is the program's version of an Alternative Break. It enables scholars to engage contemporary business issues through a cross-sector lens and takes place during the university's scheduled fall break. Though intended to launch spring 2024, plans were derailed because of recently enacted university mandates that require students to pay outof-pocket and then be reimbursed for travel and lodging expenses. We successfully resolved this dilemma and now students do not have to fund the trip in advance. The program's inaugural Explorations will launch fall 2024. This summer, staff is firming up scheduling and logistics for the 4-day trip to the nation's capital for up to 15 scholars.

Exploratory Funding

The Luther Hodges Scholar Exploratory Fund supports scholars in pursuing high-impact professional development opportunities. 2023 policy changes had mandated that students pay out-of-pocket and then be reimbursed for these activities. Starting summer 2024, students will be able to receive advance payments once again. Recent updates to the Exploratory Fund's usage guidelines are intended to encourage more students to use their funds by streamlining the process to ensure timely pay outs. These include providing a cut-off date to request funds and clearly outlining dos and don'ts to receive grants totaling \$2000 for approved professional development activities.

Scholar Dedicated Space

In the program's 5-Year Annual Review, reviewers noted a strong desire among scholars for dedicated physical space to meet up with their peers, relax, hang-out, and study. At the time, the program's consisted of two offices for staff. Thoughtful planning by the Kenan Institute generated physical space enough for four staff, study space for scholars, and a lounge replete with a couch, coffee bar, refrigerator, snacks, and more! In January, the program hosted an open house to invite and welcome scholars, staff, faculty and other friends of the program to check out our new digs on the 4th floor of the Kenan Center in suite #405.

Social Media


New Tactics

Some new tactics that have been incorporated in the social media initiative include:


- Utilizing the stories in Instagram feature is a new undertaking for the program to highlight event-day videos, as well as reminders of upcoming events for LHS or for Kenan Institute. The views overwhelmingly surpass engagement indicators of regular posts.
- Use of social media as reminders or programmatic action items. This serves as a two fold function of speaking to the current scholar audience while also share with external stakeholders aspects of program activities.
- Posts highlighting scholar blogs on LHS website. We have had the goal of incorporating at least four blogs a month on to the website specifically written by the scholars. These are then highlighted via social media as a way to drive traffic to the website and highlight aspects in the program from their vantage point.

Applicant Profile

Interest in the program continues to grow, as shown by another record year of applications in 2023! The Class of 2026 selection process included 87 total applicants and 47 finalist interviews. Those numbers represent both the most total applications submitted and most total finalist interviews conducted in our program's history. Professional interests and campus involvements of this year's applicants show the diverse background and skills of our scholar community and we look forward to the impact those selected for the Class of 2026 will make within Kenan-Flagler, UNC, and beyond!

SCHOLARS

The Luther Hodges Scholars Program is a distinguished collective of future business leaders from diverse backgrounds and interests, all dedicated to "changing the world for the better." For the 2023-2024 academic year, the program proudly engaged 67 scholars, encompassing sophomores, juniors, and seniors. Of these scholars, approximately 60% are from North Carolina, while 10% identify as international students, enriching the program with their global perspectives.

Nearly 90% of Hodges Scholars major in Business Administration. Notably, 55% of these scholars pursue double majors in a variety of disciplines, including Public Policy, Economics, Statistics, Human Organizational Leadership & Development, Environmental Sciences, Computer Science, and Psychology. This interdisciplinary approach equips them with a broad and versatile skill set, enhancing their capacity to address complex challenges as cross-sector leaders.

The gender composition of our scholars is approximately 52% female and 48% male, highlighting our commitment to fostering an inclusive and balanced environment. The Luther Hodges Scholars Program continues to nurture and develop outstanding individuals who are poised to make significant contributions to society and the global business landscape.



'24 Graduates in Review



The Class of 2024 leaves the Luther Hodges Scholars Program with a lasting legacy and profound impact. This graduation is particularly special, as it marks the culmination of a journey that began under extraordinary circumstances. Four years ago, in 2020, the world was thrust into a global pandemic, leading to nationwide shutdowns to curb the spread of COVID-19. At that time, the Class of 2024 were first-year students at UNC, sent home just eight days after starting their college experience. They spent the rest of their first year taking classes remotely, foreshadowing an unconventional collegiate journey.

Throughout their time at UNC, the Class of 2024 faced a series of tragic and triumphant events. Despite these challenges, they remained resilient, strong, and committed to their purpose of changing the world. This year's graduates are poised to enter the business and non-profit sectors in diverse fields such as consulting, sustainability, marketing, and investment banking. 

You are not always going to know everything going on in somebody's life, so it is important to give people grace and be flexible in how you approach and tackle problems. It is also important when to be a leader and when to be a follower. The best leaders empower those around them and encourage

School Experience

How did you balance the demands of your business coursework with the rigorous training schedule of ROTC? What strategies have you found to be effective for managing your time and maximizing your performance in both areas?

Many of my classes at Kenan-Flagler gave me the opportunity to work on cases and present solutions to business problems through group presentations. These experiences sharpened my strategies around research and presenting. This focus on professionalism is something that made me a more vocal and diligent leader within the ROTC program. I was able to identify potential problems and construct solutions before they would occur. Being proactive and motivated to make a difference is a mentality I forged at Carolina, and will carry into my career in the military. others to grow into leaders themselves. Having this type of mentality is something that did not come naturally to me, but was cultivated during my time at Carolina.

ROTC quickly teaches you time management skills. Staying organized with something as simple as a Google Calendar and daily planner helped me manage my tasks and assignments throughout my time at UNC. We get tasks in ROTC as well, with the difficulty and responsibility of them increasing exponentially as you spend more years in the program. The biggest thing I had to figure out was how to prioritize.



In what ways has the Luther Hodges Scholars program and ROTC shaped you?

The Luther Hodges Scholars program shaped me into a more intentional leader. With the mentorship I received from the LHS staff, I was able to lay out specific goals I wanted to accomplish in the public sector. By networking with some LHS alumni, I was able to discover internship opportunities with the Kay Yow Cancer Fund in Raleigh and a community foundation in my hometown. These internships helped me diversify my professional skillset and showed me a variety of ways I could impact the communities I lived in.

On the ROTC side, words could never do justice the impact the Army ROTC program at UNC has had on me. It has given me several professional mentors, as well as friends for life. Balancing ROTC with everything else college has to offer has consistently challenged me. The challenge of learning a profession has been a fulfilling experience. I am thankful for ROTC because it helped me realize just how important a life of service and giving back is.

Future Plans

What advice do you want to share to prospective and current scholars? What would you say to those who are considering ROTC for any branch?

My top piece of advice I want to share is that networking is not just a business skill, it is a life skill.

People at UNC, both peers and alumni, want to help, you just have to be proactive in reaching out and advocating for yourself. There is a shared love for this university that is not found at every school, so don't be afraid to ask questions and connect with people, even if the only thing you initially share with them is an affiliation with this school.

For those who are considering joining ROTC, I would say it is a tremendous advantage having the leadership development you'll receive in ROTC.

From my perspective, it was so valuable being able to compare and combine the leadership skills I developed in both KFBS and the ROTC program. Leadership is applicable in any field and at any job. It can take many forms, but being able to lead and build teams will always be valued.

What's next for you?

I will be going to Joint Base Lewis-McChord in Tacoma, Washington to serve as a 2nd Lieutenant in a Stryker Brigade. My MOS is a Medical Service Corps Officer, which means I will be coordinating the training and logistics of the medical personnel within a battalion.



Scholarly Research in Business



Research is one of the program's three core competencies, a research experience is a signature component of the program. Research drives innovation and is critical to conducting business in today's economy. Employers place a premium on workers who are adept at solving problems, who think critically, and who can interpret data and communicate findings clearly and convincingly to a variety of audiences. During their senior year, scholars worked closely with Kenan-Flagler faculty to explore cutting-edge issues in business.

Research Course

To strengthen the research capabilities of our scholars, the program offers Persuasion with Data, a 1-credit mod taught by the institute's chief economist, Gerald Cohen. Students explore the intersection of business and policy research and acquire knowledge and skills in three competency areas: research mechanics, information and data literacy, and communication of research findings.

The aim is to teach scholars how to make effective datainformed arguments and the value of a data-driven approach to problem-solving and business decision-making. To move basic research discoveries quickly and efficiently into practice, scholars are supported in producing a translational research product as a final course deliverable. Completion of the course satisfies the program's research requirement.

In the senior year, scholars can further develop their research skills by choosing to either undertake an independent research project supervised by a Kenan-Flagler faculty member or pursue an honors thesis.

Research Advisor Spotlight: Gerald Cohen, PhD.

On the Value of Research, Listening, and Supporting Others



As Chief Economist for the Kenan Institute of Private Enterprise, Dr. Gerald Cohen provides strategic vision and leadership to the translational economic research and policy initiatives at the Institute. In addition to his role as chief economist, he has served also as faculty advisor for a number of scholars on their honors theses. Dr. Cohen has been married to his wife, Elizabeth, for 30 years and they have three children.

Dr. Cohen sat down with us to share his professional experiences and his views on the value of research and the importance of paying it forward.

You've done such tremendous work with the scholars. They love you. They love your class. It's a real value add having you as an integral part of the scholars program.

I'm honored and I love working with the scholars. So, it's really my pleasure and honor to be involved with them.

Could you tell us a bit about how you got to the Kenan Institute, considering your background is in government having served in the Obama Administration?

Sure. My father was a professor. He's a physician, but he was a medical school professor. He did a lot of groundbreaking research on treatment of special needs individuals. I think I was always interested in the idea of doing research and trying to solve problems.

(In college) I took some economics classes and I realized that I loved it. It was intuitive to me. So I said, "I'd like be like the professors that I had." I went to grad school. When you are in grad school, you're socialized to be a professor, and I loved teaching but it so happened that I ended up having two job offers. One was to be a professor at the College of William & Mary and the other one was to work at the New York Federal Reserve. My wife and I, who we were then engaged and to be married the summer before we started, said let's try New York. My wife was a fundraiser, and New York is a great place to be a fundraiser. So we went on this path that we didn't expect and that took me down a set of paths that I didn't expect.

First, I was at the Federal Reserve and then in the private sector, and then back to Treasury, and then I did a series of jobs in the private sector. Eventually I wanted to go back [to academia] to teach. So when this opportunity [at the Kenan Institute] came up, it seemed like the right fit for my skillset and interest in being in an academic setting, teaching, doing research, and having that bend towards being solutions oriented.

Why do you think research is important?

We need high quality research to solve big problems. If I think about some of the biggest economic problems facing society, I think most people would say, "This is a problem and we need to do something about it." Without research, we would not know why it is a problem, what has caused the problem, and then what solutions are there to solve the problem. I think that is what research does; it actually tries to solve problems.

Why do you think research is important in an undergraduate business education?

Most people are hired to solve a problem. So, I think having that research experience allows them to do their jobs better.

What do you enjoy about teaching?

I love interacting with students and seeing their faces light up when they get something. I call it my teaching high, getting the sense that I just taught them something and watching the learning process occur. In many cases, my own insights come from their questions. It is super helpful to make me think about an issue in a way that I had not thought about it. When an expert looks at something, we spend our lives thinking about it. When a non-expert looks at it, they bring a fresh perspective. I love that.

What do you enjoy about serving as honors thesis advisor?

I'll say the fun part of doing that, advising the scholars on individual research, is that I learn a lot about different topics. For example, Shane Gravelle, who I advised this past year, researched a topic on second chance hiring, which I knew nothing about. I got to learn along with him. I get to be the beneficiary and foster excitement about learning about the students' topics. I have learned something from all of the students I have worked with. They help me think about the world in a different way.

When you are not working, what do you do to relax?

I love spending time with my family. This goes back to being an economist and seeing all of the research on how experiences are better than things. I'm very much about experiences. I avoid going shopping, but I love when we travel. I like going a bit off the beaten path, and you know, not just sitting in a bus looking at sites, but actually going hiking or biking. I think one of the things that is most relaxing for me is fishing. When I need a break or want quality alone time, I go fishing. I find it very meditative, fly fishing in particular. You can find beauty in any stream. There's also the challenge of trying to figure out how to catch a fish using a fly that I've personally tied. That's very meditative to me and relaxing.

Increasing the Power of the Vote: Ranked Choice Voting and Partisan Sentiment

Honors Thesis

This thesis is an investigation into how the two major parties interact with ranked choice voting – an alternative to traditional means of conducting elections. My primary research question explores what the relationship is between stated political affiliation and opinion on ranked choice voting among eligible voters in the US. While still a relatively new concept, there is thorough academic literature into the potential benefits of ranked choice voting in improving voter satisfaction and engagement and reducing political polarization. The aim of this research paper is to fill a gap where academic research on this topic seems to be absent – who exactly understands and supports ranked choice voting? This paper implements univariate, bivariate, multivariate, and geographic analyses to answer this question and provide demographic insights that can advise policymakers on strategies to educate people on this topic and its potential to improve the power of the vote. These analyses found that democrats are more likely to both understand and support ranked choice voting, that a large majority of ranked choice voting municipalities are politically blue areas, and that individuals with a voting history are more likely to understand ranked choice voting - all of these findings are backed with statistical significances.

Mentor Spotlight: Rob Mazzoni '05



After completing his MBA, Rob returned to TrueBridge Capital to continue investing in venture capital funds and technology companies, as well as co-lead its direct investment fund. In January 2023, Rob joined Wellington Management to lead software investing for the late stage venture capital fund.

Rob grew up around the field of business, observing his father's working in procurement at The Hershey Company. For him, business, and specifically investing, was always his chosen career path. According to Rob, not only do you have to constantly learn new

It all started at a basketball camp in middle school. As a kid from Lebanon, Pennsylvania, Rob Mazzoni grew up a huge basketball fan. Knowing about UNC because of Michael Jordan, Rob attended Carolina basketball camp in the eighth grade and fell in love with Chapel Hill. His passion for the university and for business led him to UNC's Kenan-Flagler Business School where he completed an honors thesis advised by Dr. Greg Brown. While at Kenan-Flagler, Rob gained an appreciation for investing, capital markets, and endowments and following graduation began his professional career with UNC Management Company, focusing on private equity.

After spending two years working with UNC Management Company, Mel Williams, a close mentor to Mazzoni, founded the upstart investment firm TrueBridge Capital. In reflecting on his decision to join the firm, Rob explained that "the way he [Mel] invested in people I found incredibly compelling...and it was an opportunity to go deep in venture capital, and hopefully become an expert in the asset class." He later decided to pursue his MBA at the University of Chicago Booth School of Business, using this time to enhance his credentials and build his network. things, as innovation is an undercurrent to technology investing; hard work and drive are often rewarded in the business world. Appreciation for these are due, in part, to the values instilled in him by his parents from a young age—in "whatever you do, do it well and see it through."

Rob got connected with Luther Hodges Scholars (then Kenan Scholars) in 2018 through his close relationship with his college advisor and then executive director of the Kenan Institute, Greg Brown. He was attracted by the program's mission to expose students to the various ways business can make an impact, as Rob has always considered investing an impactful career path. "The capital we manage is on behalf of endowments, foundations, and pensions, and we invest that capital in technologies that can shape our future", he said. Rob also expressed his passion for mentorship and service as a driving force for his investment in the program. "I have always loved trying to teach and work with people and serve as a mentor. I viewed it as a natural conduit to mentor UNC students", he shared.



Upon reflection, Rob acknowledged a deep appreciation for the mentors in his life. From the work ethic his father instilled, to his mother's unwavering confidence in him, Mazzoni spoke of the value of having wonderful supportive parents. He shared that "It's just so meaningful. It's something I try to think about with my kids...believing in them." In addition to his parents, Rob acknowledged the impact of Mel Williams' mentorship on his life and career and appreciation of Greg Brown's encouragement of his academic and professional career, including an introduction that landed Rob his first investing job interview, which played a key role in his ultimate career path.

For Rob, there are key indicators that can help students identify a potential mentor. These include someone who is responsive, present, thoughtful, and has a desire to invest in you. He also believes that professional and personal success are intertwined with having an impact. "Any type of job or path you take is going to feel hard. So I want to make what I do also feel meaningful", he shared. He added that it's vital to maintain your priorities. For Rob, "family is everything".

From mentoring scholars, to presenting at events and providing guidance as a member of the program's Advisory Council, Rob Mazzoni's contributions to Luther Hodges Scholars have deeply strengthened our community. We are so appreciative to him for his leadership and investments. His positive impact will continue to be felt through not only his own career and volunteer efforts, but also through the scholars he inspires.

Why did you pursue a business degree?

From a young age, I was volunteering in my community which created a strong foundation for my values. To me, business is an opportunity to advance change. The industry has a strong influence on the way we live and the potential to correct complex problems. I wanted to utilize my business degree to promote sustainable projects that improved communities. like-minded people driven to see cross-sector work as a force for the public good.

What is your overall experience at UNC/KFBS and as a Scholar?

Kenan Scholars was my favorite aspect of my business school experience. It provided me with a brilliant cohort, inspiring mentors, ample resources, and most importantly an encouraging environment to grow beyond the boundaries of traditional business. I was able to achieve so much academically and personally because of the opportunities [afforded by the program].

Why did you choose to study at UNC/KFBS?

No other place felt like home. I toured a lot of colleges near my hometown in Illinois, but none of them felt like a place I could grow and be surrounded by a supportive environment at the same time. When I found UNC, I knew instantly that this was the place for me. Kenan-Flagler was like the cherry on top that gave me the extra prestige and challenge that I wanted to have in a college experience to push myself beyond my expectations.

What person, course, or experience most influenced you when at KFBS/UNC?

It's so hard to pick just one because the Scholars program has so many pieces that allowed me to grow in different ways.

- Research: Professor Jeff Mittelstadt (thesis advisor) On the first day of his job, I went to Jeff's office. I was eager and excited to have a professor who focused on sustainability at KFBS. From that day on, not only did Jeff come to be my thesis advisor, but he was a mentor and consultant for all the thoughts and ideas I had about sustainability in business. Additionally, his interdisciplinary career path is an inspiration and reminder to me that you don't need a linear or industry-specific path to still have it all fit together like a puzzle.
- Mentor: Martin Sather Martin was an enormous help in preparing me for the job that I have now. In preparation for my interviews, I would practice with Martin and ask him questions that I did not feel comfortable asking in class about finance and the stock market.

Surviving another country together on the other side of the world and working together on projects that supported the Thai community created a [forever] bond between us. I know I can count on her for anything. Andrea is a life-long friend and sponsor of my career path.

Lessons Learned

What life lessons would you like to share with students?

Whenever possible, walk away from tech and reconnect with your community. The best connections, opportunities, and lessons I have had in life happened offline. I've learned that there is great value in taking time away from the desk to check in on those around you and to develop your soft skills.

What advice do you have for students who are transitioning from college to the 'real world'?

Seek out learning opportunities. There are no more required classes or reading assignments, and it is quite easy to fall into only learning about your job and industry since that will become your new daily routine. However, the things that got you to where you are now will not get you to where you want to be. Find opportunities to follow your curiosities through reading, classes, or peer group activities. Every person, place, and thing can be a learning opportunity if you have an open mind and seek to understand.

Is there anything else you'd like to share?

If there is one thing I could tell all scholars, it's to make theabsolute most of the program. If you engage at events, meet with mentors, and pursue research that you care about, the things you will get out of this program will take you much farther in life than you'd ever expected.





Alumni by Graduation Year






